

2022 IMPACT UPPATE



FOOD INSECURITY REMAINS HIGH



46%

According to the Washington State Food Security Survey (WAFOOD4) conducted from December 2022 to January 2023, food insecurity remains high, with 46% of the surveyed households in King County experiencing low to very low food security in the past month.

Food insecurity was higher in households with children, households of BIPOC respondents, households with low income, and renters. For food insecure households, **groceries were reported as the most challenging bill to afford.**



ISSAQUAH SAMMAMISH FOOD PROJECT




Food donations through this project have been crucial to help offset decreases in state/federal support and increases in food costs.
